4. EIA Discussion

Rian du Toit, Consulting Team

- Environmental Management Consultants will be handling the legal aspects of the project, to make sure that we comply with the Environmental Management Act.
- Why an EIA? The Constitution of Namibia states that we have to look at the environment when we do projects. In our Constitution there is a big component that forces us to look at the environment before we start with a project.
- Rules and Regulations/Legislation Constitution of Namibia, Environmental Management Act No.7 (2007)

- Environment defined bio-physical (water, soil, plants, etc), heritage, money, culture, social and legislation
- Impacts what we do and how that changes the environment (cause and affect)
 - Building a road: what is needed to build the road (layer works, materials), how does that change the environment, during operation what are the positive or negative effects of the road on the environment
 - Impacts can be positive or negative water is needed for the project, but maybe the contractor drills boreholes which the community can use once the project has been completed, so it is a positive and a negative.
- Normal stakeholder concerns of road development projects:
 - o Land taken and no benefit to stakeholder
 - Water / Materials
 - o Consider the gain of such a project: economic gain
 - Trees in the road reserve will be removed only if they are a safety concern, if not, they will be left
- The objective of Environmental Management Consultants is to:
 - Consult the public, stakeholders that know the area need to give their input (comments and concerns)
 - Consider the negative and positive impacts of the project
 - Present and Submit EIA and application for Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC)
 application to the Ministry of Environment, Forestry and Tourism (MEFT) they grant
 or reject ECC for this project
 - If ECC is granted, it is valid for 3 years, once this has been issued the project can commence. We need to avoid/minismise/reduce the negative impacts and enhance the positive impacts.
 - We want to avoid spillage, pollution (surface water/soil, etc), bad waste management practices, dangerous borrow pits, etc.
 - We want to have good management (waste, fuel, pollution), leave the borrow pit in a good condition and ultimately have a good road that will benefit the community.
 - Borrow pits: they must be left by the contractor in an acceptable condition.
- On the one hand we have the EIA to look at the impacts that this project will have and on the other hand we have the Environmental Management Plan (EMP) which will become part of the contractor's contract which addresses the negative impacts to ensure that the negative impacts are avoided or mitigated, and positive impacts are enhanced by the contractor. This is a requirement by the MEFT that the EMP is included before they approve a project.
- What is the ultimate objective of an EIA? To maintain sustainability a balance between development and conservation.

5. <u>Project Scope – Technical Discussion</u>

Rianus Gonteb, Consulting Team

- Project Activities
 - Reconnaissance visit took place in July 2022
 - Activities that have been completed: Topographical Survey, Geometric Design, Prelim Compensation Drawings, Centerline Survey and Material investigations
 - o Road design & Tender document to be completed End of November 2022
 - Tender process takes 4 -6 months
 - Construction is expected to start by May/June 2023
 - 24 months construction period
- Alignment

- We will mostly follow the existing alignment and we will not be looking at big drainage structures such as bridges, but we will still be able to follow the alignment and address the drainage issues. With regards to trees and the environment to make it safe for road users. You might have seen our surveyors in the field, they have recorded points to help tell us how the road will go, this includes water pipes, powerlines, houses in close vicinity of the road etc.
- We have to keep in mind that when we bring a new road the vehicle speed will increase, and we have to take care of road safety.

Intersection/Accesses

- o Access roads to schools and clinics next to the road.
- We will ensure that vehicle users can see any obstacles from a distance to ensure road safety.

Borrow Pits

- When we need to take material for construction, we will engage the community. We have completed the exercise of looking for suitable material.
- o In some instances, we might have to create earth dams which will be left for the community.
- There is no compensation by law for construction material taken from borrow pits.

Demining activities

 Demining along the project route as well as the areas where material will be sourced from will be demined by the Namibian Police (NAMPOL).

Compensation Policies

- There is a compensation policy in place in the Road Ordinance Act which is engaged. We will have to look at the land use of the areas which will be affected by our alignment, such as agricultural fields, houses etc. Owners will be engaged with the assistance of local and traditional authorities to ensure that the rightful owners are being compensated.
- o It needs to be made clear that the compensation is for the loss of agricultural fields, homesteads, etc, but not for the material used for construction.
- 1.5km of fence needs to be relocated, owners will be engaged.
- Limited effect on cultivated land 1 field will be affected, owners will be engaged and compensated accordingly.
- No homesteads or buildings will be affected.

• Construction Water

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 We need to be careful when doing that, we need to be careful and need to consider how much water is needed for construction, but also how much water is used by households and animals.

• Labour incentives & SME Contractors

- Before we start with the actual construction, we will make sure that in the tender document the labour issues are considered. We need to make sure that the tender document speaks to the recruitment of people from this area for the construction of the road.
- o If skilled labour is not available in the area, we can secure the unskilled and semi-skilled labour from the area. There are also opportunities for people to be trained, to upskill themselves while working on the project. Hopefully once the project is completed people will use this skill and turn into SMEs that can take care of the maintenance of the road. The recruitment of the people will happen in consultation with the Governor, Councillors, Headmen and Traditional Authorities and that process will be laid out in the tender document.

6. Questions & Answers

- Q (Augustino Joel): Please elaborate on the compensation process:
 A (Rianus Gonteb): The RA adopt the compensation policy as issued by the Government.
 Only certain areas are subjected for compensation, these are agricultural/cultivated land, fruit bearing trees, homesteads etc. Surveys have been done and land use and location buildings etc recorded.
- 2. **Q (Sakeus Kaudinge):** Would I be compensated if a BP is found in my agricultural field? **A (Rianus Gonteb):** Yes, it will be done according to the Compensation Policy.
- 3. **Q (David):** Will the appointed contractor bring his own personnel? **A (Rianus Gonteb):** The contractor would most likely bring his skilled operators to site.

 However, the unskilled labourers will be sourced locally from within the project area, this will be written into the tender document.
- 4. Q (Angula & Johannes Awirigo): Please shed light on the recruitment process / Would there be a limitation of age during the recruitment process?
 A (Rianus Gonteb): The recruitment process will only be dealt with at the next phase of the project. It will be done consultation with the Governor's Office, Region council, Constituency Offices, and the Traditional Authority Offices, i.e., headmen/women etc.
- 5. **Q (Rosalia):** Would training be offered during the project? Will women also be employed on the project?
 - **A (Rianus Gonteb):** Yes, it will be done in accordance with the construction contract. Government is promoting employment of youth and women on projects.
- 6. **Q (Solomon Abraham):** If a borehole is drilled in my field, is it mine? **A (Rianus Gonteb):** The borehole becomes state property and will have a number allocated to it when it is handed over to MAWLR.
- 7. **Hon Walde Ndevashiya addressing community:** This project is happening, and you should not be concerned that this funding will be diverted to other projects. We are hoping that the timelines that are being presented are adhered to, the community has been waiting for this

project for a long time. There will not be compensation for buildings built after the survey has been done, people tend to be deliberate.

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6. Questions & Answers

1. **Q (Silka Shikongo):** We understand that the road alignment will be on the western side of the school.

We have applied for additional land in that area, but it has not been formally allocated. A (Rinaus Gonteb): all areas that will be impacted by the road alignment have already been mapped. Therefore, only these areas will be compensated for.

- 2. **Q (Elisabeth Amungundu):** What happens in the case if no good material could be found. Could the community members assist in that regard,
 - **A (Rinaus Gonteb)**: The Consultant has an experienced team that can source good road construction mater. They have already completed this process with a parameter of 5km from the road centreline to avoid excessive haul road distances
- 3. **Q (Joshua Ndipwashimwe):** What does the borrow pit rehabilitation process entail. Can borrow pits be left open for water storage?
 - **A (Rianus Gonteb):** all borrow pit areas will be rehabilitated. Thus, it will be left in a safe condition where people and animals could access without difficulty. The borrow pit will also be transformed into safe earth dams for rainwater storage.
- 4. **Q/Comment (Thoimas Ndafeni):** Appreciates that the project is going ahead and thanks delegation for explaining the project now we understand the process.
- 5. **Q/Comment (Loide Shikukukumwa):** Procurement: The RA should ensure the appointment of reputable contractors to complete the works satisfactory.
 - **A (Rianus):** The construction contract is divided into two parts: The first part that is plant intensive is assigned to the (experienced) main contractor. The other part will be assigned to SMEs that have undergone appropriate training programmes.
- 6. **Q (Lasarus Ndafelai):** Please explain the borehole /water sourcing strategy **A (Rianus Gonteb):** The water sourcing process has been completed. In the case of shared water resources, the community and livestock will be prioritised and only the reserve water will be used for road construction. If no existing water sources are found, new boreholes will be drilled and used for road construction., These boreholes will be sealed off at the end of the

project and hand over to the Ministry of Agriculture, Water Affairs and Land Reform for further ownership etc.

- 7. **Q (Paulus Ndafelai & Eliah Petrus):** Please shed light on the recruitment process: **A (Rianus Gonteb):** The recruitment process will only be dealt with at the next phase of the project. It will be done consultation with the Governor's Office, Region council, Constituency Offices, and the Traditional Authority Offices, i.e., headmen/women etc.
