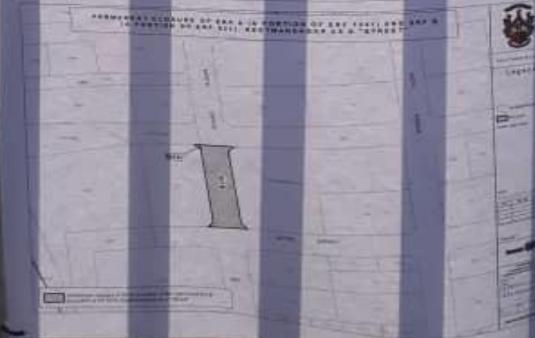

The idiomatic expression "don't throw the baby out with the bathwater" comes to mind when debates start stirring on social media regulation.

This idiom describes an avoidable error in which something good is eliminated when trying to get rid of something bad, or in other words, rejecting the favourable along with the unfavourable.

In terms of social media, there are a host of favourable outcomes, including a massive sharing of ideas through debate and other forms of expression, and the strengthening social awareness and empathy, among others. In the same vein, it also nurtures negatives like the proliferation of fake news, cyberbullying, negative body image and the like. It is inevitable that the recent announcement by information minister Stanley Simataa that Cabinet approved a resolution to regulate social media will be viewed with suspicion. Simataa claimed this regulation would be aimed at punishing anyone spreading content that encourages young girls to indulge in sexual acts, which in turn leads to an increase in teenage pregnancies. However, as social commentators have pointed out, this seems to be a continuation of a motion to regulate social media tabled in Parliament last year by Swapo chief whip Evelyn Nawaases-Tayeze, who claimed that young people in Namibia were using social media to fuel propaganda and insult national leaders. In terms of self-regulation, Facebook, which owns Instagram, has more than 35 000 people around the world working on safety and security, and it also releases statistics on its content removals.

Between July and September 2019, it took action on 30.3 million pieces of content, of which it found 98.4% before any users flagged it. This points to self-regulation that can be further explored by governments with social media sites.

In the Namibian context, where political and social debates occur with ferocity on social media every day, any move by government to regulate such platforms will be seen as an attack on freedom of expression, and can be linked to the ruling party and the president's waning popularity.

At the first court appearance of suspended Fishcor CEO Mike Nghipunya, who was arrested yesterday, five of the original six main accused were also present to hear that new charges were added to their files in connection with money allegedly laundered through entities called Salex and DHC Inc. It was alleged that N\$75 million of Fishcor's money was laundered using these firms. Former justice minister Shanghala faces an additional charge of obstructing the course of justice. He, Esau, James Hatuikulipi and Nghipunya are further accused of using state money for self-gratification. Pius Mwatelulo and Tamson 'Fitty' Hatuikulipi are accused conspiring in these alleged

crimes.

James now also faces a further charge of attempting to bribe an Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) investigator.

He allegedly offered N\$250 000 for bank cards and an assets allocation sheet that forms part of the Fishrot evidence.

The matter was postponed to 23 April. Bail was opposed due to the seriousness of the crimes. It was also indicated that the accused may abscond, and that they may interfere with investigations. The State also argued it was not in public interest to release them.

They will all remain in custody at the Windhoek Correctional Facility. Lawyers for the other main had accused asked for their hearing to continue on Thursday, while Nghipunya's lawyer asked that his case be heard on 23 April.

The Act was amended in 2015 to give Esau powers to allocate rights as he saw fit – leading to his stripping many private companies of fishing rights.

Those who lost such rights ended up retrenching thousands of fishermen.

Esau's amendment of the law followed a 2014 High Court ruling that said his allocation of 10 000 metric tonnes of horse mackerel to state-owned fishing

company Fishcor was illegal because the entity was not a horse-mackerel fishing rights holder.

The allocation of the rights to Fishcor is now seen as a smoke-screen to allocate them to Icelandic seafood company Samherji in return for kickbacks to those implicated in the Fishrot debacle. It is alleged that over N\$150 million in bribes changed hands.

This was done under the guise of 'Namibianisation' of the sector.

The main accused in the Fishrot matter are James Ha-

The scandal has led to the arrest of their former colleague and board chairperson, James Hatuikulipi, and CEO Mike Nghipunya.

Other board members include regional governors Usko Nghaamwa (Ohangwena) and Sirkka Ausiku (Kavango West), fisheries ministry executive director Dr Moses Maurihungirire, Dr Bennet Kangumu, Ndaendomwenyo Sheya and Claretta

Gamses, who later resigned.

They all served at the height of what is now fast becoming Namibia's biggest post-independence corruption scandal, which involved using Fishcor as a vehicle in a grand bribery scheme involving about N\$150 million.

Questions have sprung up in recent months as to how the alleged unethical conduct could occur with ease and finesse without the board acting on it.

Known as 'Fishrot', the scandal arose from former fisheries minister Bernhardt Esau allegedly pushing through an amendment

to the Marine Resources Act that gave him powers to distribute fishing quotas as he saw fit.

Using his newly acquired powers, Esau stripped many private companies of fishing rights and handed them to Fishcor – allegedly as a smokescreen to allocate them to Icelandic seafood company Samherji in return for kickbacks to those now implicated in the Fishrot debacle.

Those who lost such rights ended up retrenching thousands of fishermen. Nghaamwa said as board members they were not always privy to what the compa-

Greed got us here

Angula says corruption has been allowed to flourish in Namib-

ia because those perpetrating the theft of state resources believe they are protected by the political elite.

"I do not know what really happened to the ethical and moral fabric of our society. People simply became greedy," Angula said yesterday during a wide-ranging interview with *Namibian Sun*.

"When people become so brazen, you would suspect they might have gotten an example from somebody high up there. They feel protected somehow. You cannot go and do these illegal things over and over," Angula said.

ny's executives were up to. "In each and every business, there are technical components that cannot just be known by everybody. These technical components can only be known by those running the business. This is exactly what happened at Fishcor," said Nghaamwa, himself a successful businessman. "Those running the business use these technical components to enrich themselves. As board members we just thought the company was doing well according to the report and presentations we were receiving." Ausiku contended that when she became a board member of Fishcor in May 2017, much of the alleged bribery had already occurred.

"From which year now, when did I join the board? Some of these things were done when we were not there. Now how do I respond to something I was not a part of?" she said.

Kangumu, who is currently acting as board chairperson after James Hatuikulipi's resignation, said he too did not know about the alleged bribes.

"Fishrot does not equal Fishcor, and vice versa, which has largely been ignored by the media, which could provide insight into how things were handled," he said.

"Amidst all this, we firmly believe that culprits will not perpetually evade the long arm of the law, including within the current board if any," he commented.

So far the main accused in the Fishrot matter are James Hatuikulipi, his cousin Tamson Hatuikulipi, former justice minister Sacky Shanghala, former fisheries minister Bernhardt Esau, Nghipunya, suspended Investec employee Ricardo Gustavo, Hanganeni employee Pius Mwatelulo and Nghipunya. Also arrested were three hangers-on of the main accused who face separate charges.

Dark shadow over fishing quotas

With a total of 5 190 fishing rights applications received by 31 August 2018 for the 90 to 120 rights available in the new allocation cycle, many Namibians are holding their breath ahead of the announcement.

These applications represent a massive increase from previous processes, where the number of applicants ranged between 500 to 1 500.

This speaks to a hunger to share in their country's resources, especially fisheries. Hanging like a dark cloud over the allocation process, which we report today is expected to be finalised at the end of March, is the soul-destroying allegations that a few individuals, with their hands on the levers of power, had used our country's resources to get stinking rich.

The so-called Fishrot saga continues to expose just how tainted and abused our government processes have become in Namibia.

With this in mind, it remains highly suspect that the quota allocation process, started by a former fisheries minister who is now among the Fishrot accused, has been allowed to run to its conclusion.

This immediately raises questions around the bona fides of the process and whether ordinary Namibians can trust the outcome. As allegations of favouritism and cabals being positioned to benefit from the latest quotas increasingly swirl, it becomes even more critical for this process to be beyond reproach.

The last thing the incoming administration of 21 March needs is backlash when the new quota owners are announced and their political and other connections are exposed. Ordinary Namibians everywhere have grown tired of processes that seem to exclusively favour the connected in one of the most unequal nations in the world. This is a golden opportunity for leadership to be shown in this regard.

It is no longer good enough to talk; it is time to walk the walk and deliver a fully transparent and ethical process that will be accepted by those who remain hungry and ostracised from the feeding trough in the country of their birth.

According to him, investors are looking for incentives to reach out to remote areas, but government is not forthcoming.

"It cannot be right. We must realign our thinking and do the right thing. For now, I must say

it is my moral obligation to say it publicly and transparently and [I] may step on people's toes," he said.

This law provides for the establishment, development and management of export processing zones in Namibia. Tweya added that this state of affairs has made the Namibian youth angry and brought on a ticking time bomb of unemployed youth. Leaders,

he said, should therefore not be a stumbling block for the progress of the youth.

"It cannot be correct. If we hear them, let us do something about it. When that time bomb explodes, we will all be finished. Let us not tell them they must first wait until we retire before they are given an opportunity," he said.

When contacted for clarity yesterday, Tweya was unrepentant

about his remarks.

He emphasised that the HPP is not a policy, but in fact a plan.

"It is the year of introspection. We have to look inwards. Some policies that are advanced must be addressed. We are still quoting from laws dating from 1970, a time when this country was still a colony. What is so sensational about it?" he said.

We even asked them to allow us to sell land with conditions, but nothing. "That is why you see people mushrooming in informal settlements," he said.

Hindjou said he has turned away more than 10 companies, including foreign investors, because their pleas to sell land with conditions had been turned down.

"I have stopped counting. We had people who wanted to set up a tissue factory, a tyre shop, even private schools and spare part companies. We even had people who wanted to set up a dry port here for their containers from Walvis Bay, because we are close to the Botswana bor-

der," said Hindjou. There had also been a solar plant on the cards, which would have given the town a means of collecting revenue, but this too has fallen by the wayside as a result of the moratorium.

Even public-private partnerships (PPP) for the servicing of about 300 residential plots in the Veddersdal location has been brought to a standstill. "You see, any municipality cannot rely on revenue collection. With that you can only pay your small service providers such as security companies, but what about the service delivery to the people of the town? Other towns are selling land to give services such as taps in informal settlements, road infrastructure and buildings. And there is no way we can do that with revenue collection," Hindjou said.

For the past five years, Okahandja's saving grace has been an ad hoc investment account used for emergencies. According to Hindjou, they deposit N\$200 000 on a monthly basis into the account and have, to date, taken about N\$8 to N\$9 million to pay salaries.

Faeces and flies

Amid this administrative crisis, residents of the Vyf Rand Kamp and Vergenoeg informal settlements are forced to live next to garbage dumps covered with faeces and urine.

They are also denied access to water as communal taps have dried up. According to Bartholomeus Kampungu, a resident of Vyf Rand Kamp, they wake up at 03:00 to collect water for household purposes. And since there are no toilets, people are

forced to use the nearby river or the bushes. "Little children, as you can see, cannot go to the river, so they relieve themselves here between the houses," Kampungu said.

Then there are those who simply cannot afford to buy the N\$300 water card.

"The tap is broken most of the time, then we must go to Oshitanda, which is about five kilometres away from here. As a result, most of us get to work late because we arrive very late from the water tap," Kampungu said. Another resident Paulus Mattheu said children and elderly often have diarrhoea because of the unhygienic situation at the settlement. Attempts to get hold of minister of rural and urban development Peya Mushelenga were unsuccessful.

In the main of four criminal cases currently before the courts, former fisheries Bernhard Esau and his five co-accused, known as the Fishrot Six, are among others accused of awarding or conspiring to award up to 55 000 metric tonnes of horse mackerel to Namgomar Pesca Namibia (Pty) Ltd between 2014 and 2019, which in turn dish out the lucrative quotas to Samherji and its local subsidiaries.

The charges elaborate that between 2014 and 2019 the accused, acting in common purpose, directly or indirectly corruptly and intentionally solicited, accepted or agreed to accept N\$103 636 448.75 for their benefit from Mermaria Sea Food Namibia (Pty) Ltd and/or Esja Seafood Pty (Ltd) for their own gratification, so they could continue to receive fishing quotas.

They are also accused of acting in common purpose to wrongfully, unlawfully, falsely and with the intent to defraud, misrepresent the Namibian government.

This relates to a memorandum signed with the Angolan government on 18 June 2014 that was effectively used to circumvent the Marine Resources Act in the allocation of fishing quotas. Kawana pushes forward with quota allocations

Acting fisheries minister Albert Kawana confirmed to *Namibian Sun* that the process to allocate fishing quotas should be completed by the end of March, at which point the fisheries minister will, after consultation with

Cabinet, announce the successful applicants. A new cabinet is set to be sworn in on or after 21 March. Kawana said the University of Namibia (Unam) was roped in to help the ministry allocate the fishing rights.

Existing fishing rights holders have been granted permission by Cabinet to net a third of the total allowable catch (TAC) for various species until the end of the current financial year on 31 March, while prospective rights holders have not been informed about the status of their applications.

Last November, prior to his arrest in connection with the Fishrot bribery scandal, former fisheries minister Bernhard Esau told *New Era* that a committee set up to evaluate over 5 000 fishing rights applications had completed 80% of its work.

The fisheries ministry announced that a total of 5 190 fishing rights applications were received by 31 August 2018 for the 90 to 120 rights available. This presented a massive increase from previous applications, which ranged in the region of 500 to 1 500.

Giving an update on the way forward, Kawana said noticeable progress had been made.

"What we have done now as we announced already, we assigned this function of processing these things to Unam and we are waiting," he said.

Cabinet would then be consulted before the new fisheries minister announces the allocations, he said. "I hope this process will be completed by March," Kawana said. He also promised full transparency.

Kawana said the Fishrot scandal, in

which bribes are alleged to have been accepted for the allocation of lucrative fishing quotas, should not allow foreign nationals and entities to gain a foothold on the fishing sector. According to him, unlike other industries, fisheries was dominated by Namibians and would remain that way.

"The fisheries sector is more than 90% owned by Namibians so that to me is a very proud record. Let us keep it that way... We want to see even more Namibians own these resources," he said.

GABORONE - At least 46 rhinos have been slaughtered in Botswana in 10 months, a government official said on Monday as the southern African wildlife haven reported a surge in poaching of the endangered species.

The killings - slightly under 10% of Botswana's total rhino population - have occurred in the northern Moremi Game Reserve since April last year.

"Poaching has risen at an alarming rate in this area," Moemi Batshabang, a deputy director with the government's wildlife department told AFP.

Nearly 50 rhinos killed in Botswana in 10 months

"I can attest that 46 rhinos have been killed by highly organised poachers between April last year to date," he said.

Botswana is home to 500 rhinos, according to international conservation charity, Save the Rhino.

They are a protected species in Botswana and fall outside the government's recent decision to

end a five-year ban on trophy-hunting licences, which is largely targeted at the burgeoning elephant population.

Most of the rhinos roam the grassy plains of the northern Okavango Delta, where Moremi Game Reserve is situated.

"The increase in poaching of both the black and white rhino is of concern and unusual," said

Batshabang.

The unprecedented rate of poaching last year prompted the government to warn that the rhino population could be wiped out in the southern African country by 2021.

Thousands of rhinos that once roamed Africa and Asia have been culled by poaching and habitat loss. Very few are found outside

national parks and reserves.

Poaching is fuelled by a seemingly insatiable demand for rhino horn in Asia, where it is coveted as a traditional medicine or an aphrodisiac, and can fetch up to US\$60 000 per kilogramme.

Rhino horn is composed mainly of keratin, the same substance as in human nails.

Botswana's neighbour South Africa, home to 80 percent of the world's remaining rhinos and the epicentre of rhino poaching, lost 594 rhinos to poachers last year. The good news is that this marks a 23% drop from the previous year.

Lesotho PM under pressure to resign

MASERU - Pressure mounted on Lesotho Prime Minister Thomas Thabane to step down Monday as he appeared in court over the murder of his estranged wife after failing to turn up for a hearing last week.

The latest twist in a saga that has gripped the southern African kingdom came after a weekend in which the 80-year-old premier was said to be receiving emergency medical care in South Africa.

The magistrates court in Maseru had been expected to formally read out charges against Thabane for allegedly acting in "common purpose" in the June 2017 killing of 58-year old Lipolelo Thabane, whom he was in the process of divorcing.

But after a brief sitting, the matter was deferred to the High Court and the prime minister was not formally charged.

No date has been given for the prime

minister's appearance at the High Court.

But the case has increased pressure on Thabane to step down.

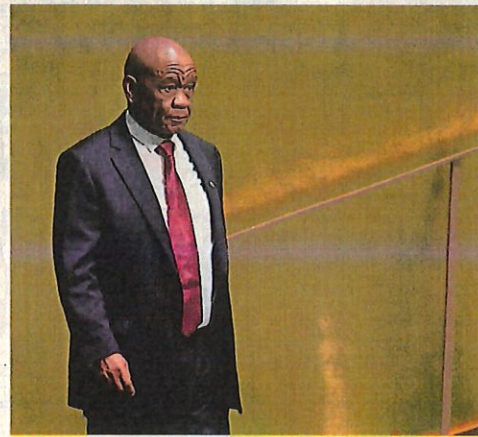
The supreme decision-making executive committee of his All Basotho Convention (ABC) party has asked him to leave office "immediately" as it picked his possible replacement.

"We have asked the PM to step down while on the other hand we have submitted (to a party parliamentary caucus) the name of Mr Sam Rapapa to succeed him," party's spokesman Montoeli Masoetsa told AFP.

Rapapa is a lawmaker and the party's chairman.

Citing advanced age, Thabane last week announced on national television that he would retire by July 31.

Thabane was accompanied to the magistrates court by his current wife Maesaiah Thabane, 42, whom he married two months after Lipolelo's death and who

is considered a co-conspirator in the murder case.

She has already been charged with murder and is out on bail.

Defence lawyer Qhalehang Letsika had argued that Thabane should not be charged as long as he remained a prime minister.

"My client cannot be prosecuted while in office but he is not above the law," said Letsika, adding the beleaguered premier was "entitled to immunity" because of his status.

Wearing a navy-blue striped suit with a powder-blue shirt and flanked by his spouse, Thabane appeared nervous as the couple sat on one of the

court benches.

During the hearing, the lawyer asked whether a sitting prime minister should be subject to criminal prosecution as this could mean that he may be held in custody.

"Whether a sitting prime minister can be criminally charged, I must admit at the outset that this is indeed a novel case in our country and whose determination we shall eagerly anticipate," magistrate Phethise Motanyane said.

Thabane had initially been due in court on Friday for the preliminary appearance but was a no-show, prompting police to warn they could issue an arrest warrant.

Hisaide initially said Thabane had gone to neighbouring South Africa for "routine health checks, but later his office said he was seeking "emergency" medical attention and would appear in court on his return.

On Saturday, police said Thabane's sick note said that the premier would be "unfit until 27 February."

Lipolelo's murder sent shockwaves through Lesotho - a tiny landlocked nation of 2.2 million with a history of political turmoil.

She was gunned down outside her home in Maseru just two days before her husband took office. The couple had been embroiled in a bitter divorce.

The accusations against the prime minister came after communications records from the scene of the murder included Thabane's mobile phone number.

The main opposition party, the Democratic Congress, on Friday filed in parliament a motion of no confidence in the prime minister.

If Thabane loses the motion he could either step down or advise King Letsie III to dissolve parliament and call for fresh elections.

On the streets of Maseru, the people of Lesotho also want him gone from office.

"He should be stripped of his title and face all the charges and, like anyone else," said Lynor Mahase. -Nampa/AFP

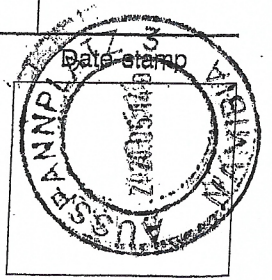
