Donkerhoek begs council for toilets

Health hazard

Residents claim they've been living without proper toilets for the past 30 years.

Donkerhoek informal settlement residents in Khorixas want the Khorixas town council to speed up construction of toilets as the residents have been without toilets since Independence 30 years ago.

In interviews with *Namapa*, residents said it is a health hazard to use holes

dug at some homes as toilets and to walk long distances to the bushes when nature calls and proper toilet facilities will be the only solution.

One of the residents, Selma Naruses, 36, said that living in informal settlements does not mean that they have to be denied basic services such as proper toilets.

"I have been living here my whole life and I would like them to build toilets for us. Councilors have come and gone with their empty promises. It is evident that they only wanted votes. It is a safety risk for us especially women and girls to walk distances just to relieve ourselves especially at night," she said.

'Ghettos'

Maria Kainus, 40, suggested to the town council to at least build one block of toilets for residents to use. "I think building a toilet at every house in the informal settlement will take more than 10 years. If they

could put up a structure with even four toilets that would be okay for now. That will show that they really care for us. After all these years why is there not even a single toilet for us that are staying in these ghettos? It is because they do not care because they have toilets at their homes," she said. Alpheus Xamseb, 39, said: "I would like the council to at least build dry toilets for us at every house like we are seeing at farms. Imagine farms

have toilets but we staying in a town don't have that."

In a recent interview with *Nampa*, Khorixas town council CEO, Andreas Howoseb said: "The council has prioritised the provision of toilets to residents in informal settlements for the 2020/21 financial year. The first priority will be the planning of the sewerage system for toilets in Donkerhoek." The informal settlement has about 5 000 inhabitants.

Robust results' for Capricorn

The analysts added: "The results were driven by strong top-line growth as net interest income increased by 2.3% y/y [year-on-year] and non-interest income delivered growth of 11.7%. The growth in net interest income was underpinned by a 5.3% y/y increase in advances, bringing the size of the advances book to N\$40.08 billion."

"Overall, the results are reasonably resilient given the economic environment," IJG said.

Cirrus commented: "While the results are good, and even better than expected, FY21 [financial year 2021] should be a more difficult period for the group with lower interest income and customers remaining distressed."

"Overall, Capricorn Group's response to a challenging year showed resilience and sustainability in our operations and people," Prinsloo said. He elaborated: "By ensuring the well-being of the business, our employees and clients as a priority during the pandemic, Capricorn Group endured and performed well under extremely challenging conditions. Bank Windhoek, our flagship brand, delivered strong results. "Profitability was under pressure in

the last three months of the financial year. The significant reduction in Namibia's repo rate by 225 basis points directly, declining by 9.8% compared to last year," Prinsloo said.

NPLs
Cirrus said Capricorn's non-performing loans increased by N\$300 million during the twelve months under review to N\$1.9 billion.

"This resulted in the NPL [non-performing loans] ratio increasing to 4.7% from 4.1% in the previous comparable period. The segmental breakdown showed that Bank Windhoek's NPLs increased 20.5% to N\$1.47 billion from N\$1.22 billion a year ago. Bank Gaborone report-

ed a 15.3% increase in NPLs during the period to BWP291.2 million or N\$198.2 million," Cirrus said.

Capricorn explained: "Impairment charges increased by 146.1% to N\$304.3 million for the year under review. Almost half of the increased charges is a direct result of stressed and prudent economic overlays, reflective of a severely depressed economic outlook, applied to the expected credit loss models. The balance of the increase is mainly due to the prudent approach applied by the group in determining expected credit losses given the current economic circumstances where many customers are experiencing financial distress."

Dividend

Capricorn declared a final dividend of 20c per ordinary share. Considering the interim dividend of 30c per ordinary share, this represents a total dividend of 50c per ordinary share.

"The total dividend per share for the year under review is 24.2% lower than the total dividend per share declared for the previous financial year. We believe that the total dividend balances prudently with a fair dividend yield for shareholders," Capricorn said.

One of the factors taken into account of the determination of the dividend was "the call by bank regulators to restrict dividend payments." "As a consequence, Bank Windhoek's final dividend to the Group was 45% lower than the previous year," Capricorn said.

Easing of fiscal consolidation policy

Agriculture, ICT, health drives growth

ICT grew due to increased activities in the usage of data as demand surged up for data and calls as workers switch from working from offices to homes.

The real Gross Domestic Product contracted by 11.1 percent during the period under review, compared to a decline of 3.6 percent in the same quarter of 2019.

Drivers
The deeper reduction in the domestic economy was observed across all sectors of the economy,

except for agriculture and forestry, ICT and health. The poor performance of the economy was mainly due to the impact of measures that were put in place to combat the spread of the coronavirus pandemic, NSA says.

The agriculture and forestry sector surged to 47.2 percent in real

value added during the second quarter of 2020, relative to a steeper contraction of 31.8 percent registered during the same quarter of 2019, NSA added.
The main driver for the improved performance stems from an increase in activities of the crop farming sub-sector, which posted a massive

growth of 296.7 percent in real value added compared to decline of 61.0 percent in the corresponding quarter of 2019. The positive performance in the sector is attributed to the number of minutes used that increased during the period under review, the report further indicates.

The Namibian Statistics Agency (NSA) recorded improved performances in the agriculture and forestry, information and communication technology (ICT) and health sectors, according to the Producer Precise Index report.

The improved growth rates of 47.2 percent were recorded for agriculture and forestry, 11.0 percent for ICT, and 6.0 percent for the health sector, compared to the previous quarter in 2019.

"The ICT sector's growth results from increased activities in the usage of data as demand surged up for data and calls as workers switch from working from offices to homes," NSA pointed out.

This was further exacerbated by demand from higher institutions switching from face-to-face teaching to online learning. Acceleration in the health sector is owed to the easing of the fiscal consolidation policy in the sector, coupled with the emergence of the pandemic that saw increased activities resulting in the employment of more health workers to assist in containing the disease, NSA emphasised.

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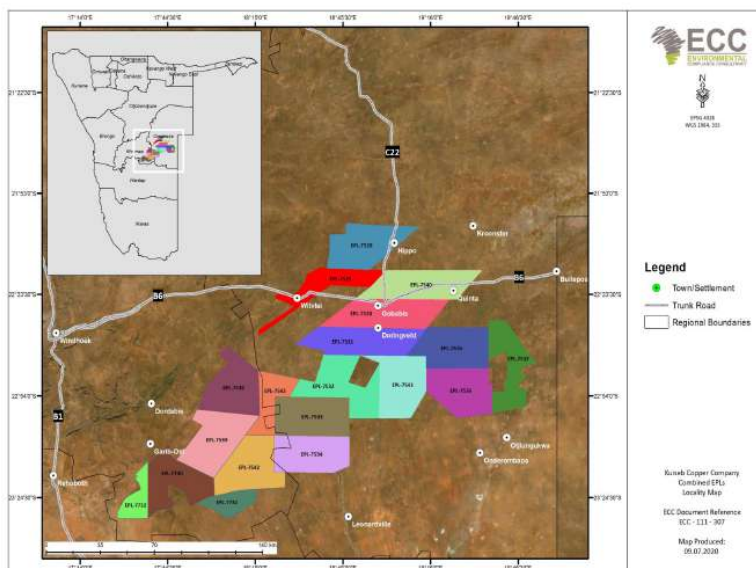

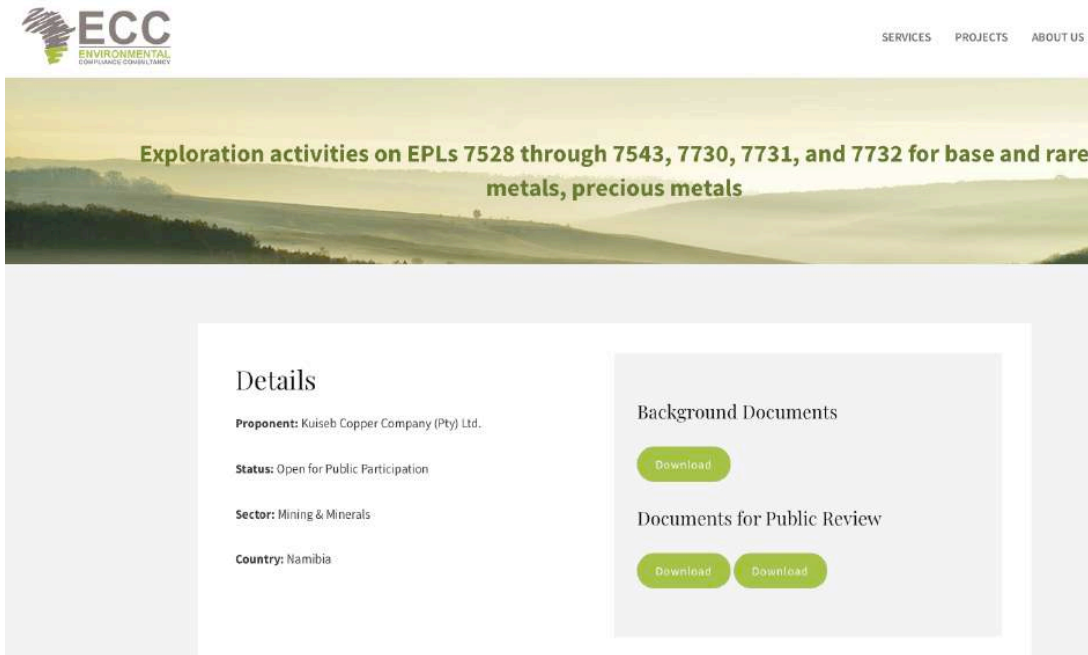
