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
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

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Long road ahead for local tourism

HE month of October has recorded a notable room and bed occupancy with 15%, compared to 5-7% between july and September, which are the traditional high season months for tourism. The majority of foreign visitors from central Furnoe.

The agriculture and forestry sectors recorded a decline of 2.5% in real value-added in the third quarter of 2020 in arison to a contraction of

comparison to a contraction of 5.5% in the same period in 2019. The weak performance is attributable to the forestry subsector that registered a decline of 25% in real value added in the third quarter of 2020, compared to a growth of 0.9% recorded in the corresponding quarter of 2019.

According to the gross domestic product (GDP) quarter,

Statistics Agency (NSA), the decline is due to reduced activities in the harvesting of timber resulting from the lockdown.

Furthermore, the livestock sub-sector registered a decline

sub-sector registered a decline of 1% in real value added, albeit an improved performance during the period under review compared to a contraction of 7.6% in the same quarter of 2019.

"The sluggish performance is attributable to weak demand by export markets, reduced animals for slaughter however, herdstock is increasing minimising the impact. Cattle export to

abattoirs and butchers registered a decline of 68%, compared to a growth of 101.1% recorded in the corresponding quarter of 2019," reads the report.




recorded a trade deficit to the tune of N\$3.9 billion. The current figure shows that the deficit worsened by 160% and 44.1% from its level of N\$2.7 billion and N\$1.5 billion recorded in October 2019 and September 2020, respectively. He said the value of exports in

October 2020 remained constant at N\$7.6 billion as observed in the corresponding period of 2019. However, when compar-to its level of NSs, 9 billic in September 2020, expor-deteriorated by 14,3%. Impor-on the other hand rose by 11.6 and 11% when compared to October 2019 and September

October 2019 and Septembe 2020 respectively. After the developments in exports and imports, Namibia's total merchandise tradi improved by 6.7% from its leve of N\$18 billion in October 2019 to N\$19.2 billion in Octobe 2020, while deteriorating by 0.7' from its level of N\$19.4 billion September 2020.






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

1 INTRODUCTION

Africa Big Rhino Mining (Pty) Ltd (hereinafter to as *The Proponent*) has been granted with Exclusive Prospecting Licenses (EPLs) No. 7430, 7587, 7629-7631 & 7633 – 7635 by the Ministry of Mines and Energy (MME). The tenure of these licenses is from 02 June 2020, and due to expire on 01 June 2023, as per the information available on the Namibia Mining Cadastre Portal. The area covered by the EPLs is prospective to five (5) group of commodities, upon which exploration activity will be conducted. The prospective commodity groups are:

- Base and Rare Metals,
- Dimension Stones,
- Precious Stones,
- Semi-Precious Stones and,
- Industrial Minerals

The EPLs are located about 46 km south of Aus, in the Karas Region, and cover a combined surface area of 322 656.8331 ha. The location of the EPLs is shown in **Figure 1** (See attached in Appendix A).

The Proponent intends to conduct prospecting and exploration activities, leading to the estimation and delineation of the target resources. Prospecting and exploration form part of the listed activities that may not be undertaken without an Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC).

Under the Environmental Management Act (EMA) (2007) and its 2012 EIA Regulations, the proposed prospecting and exploration activities are listed activities that require an ECC from the department of Environmental Affairs (DEA) of the MEFT. The relevant listed activities as per EIA regulations are:

- 3.1 The construction of facilities for any process or activities which requires a license, right of other forms of authorization, and the renewal of a license, right or other form of authorization, in terms of the Minerals (Prospecting and Mining Act, 1992).
- 3.2 other forms of mining or extraction of any natural resources whether regulated by law or not.
- 3.3 Resource extraction, manipulation, conservation and related activities.

In order to carry out mineral exploration activity on the EPLs, the Proponent is required to submit an application to the Ministry of Environment, Forestry and Tourism (MEFT) and MME. On approval of the application, The Proponent would be issued with an Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC) from the MEFT.

The Proponent appointed Excel Dynamic Solutions (Pty) Ltd (EDS), an independent team of Environmental Consultants to conduct the required Environmental Assessment (EA) process and submit the ECC application to the Environmental Commissioner on behalf of the Proponent. A draft Environmental Management Plan (EMP) will be prepared as part of the EA process. It is used by the Proponent to guide them throughout the exploration phase, to ensure that the identified environmental impacts are avoided or limited, if they cannot be avoided completely.

2 PURPOSE OF THIS DOCUMENT

The aim of the EA is to generate information on the environmental impact of the proposed exploration activities, facilitate the consideration of environmental issues in planning and decision-making processes, and give the public and other stakeholders a platform to participate in these processes. The purpose of this document is to provide background information to interested and affected parties (I&APs) of the project, thus providing an opportunity for them (I&APs) to receive information, submit their comments and raise issues regarding the environmental authorization process. The information from I&APs will help regulatory authorities (MEFT and MME) to judge

the acceptability of the project, and if deemed acceptable, issue a clearance certificate.

4 NEED AND DESIRABILTY OF THE ACTIVITY

Namibia is endowed with mineral resources and the mining industry is a noteworthy part of the national economy. The mining sector forms the vital part of some of Namibia's development plans, namely: Vision 2030, National Development Plan 5 (NDP5) and Harambee Prosperity Plan (HPP). Thus, mining is essential to the development goals of Namibia by contributing to meet the ever-increasing global demand for minerals, and for national prosperity. Successful exploration work can lead to mining activities on the EPLs, which would feed into the aforementioned development plans.

Successful exploration of minerals on the EPLs would contribute momentously to the generation of foreign currency and positively contribute to the national GDP. This in turn, can support the aim of achieving a balance between the establishment and dissemination of wealth. Partaking of local groups/organisations in the small-scale mining sector would increase local proceeds and promote creation of employment.

The exploration project is expected to generate full time medium to long term direct employment for at least 8-10 people. A large proportion of the proposed exploration project employment would be made up of skilled and semi-skilled workers (i.e. general labourers and operators). An exploration geologist and technical assistant, field data collectors, and onsite general workers will also be employed during the exploration programme. This project will contribute towards the socioeconomic development of the Karas Region and of Namibia.

5 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The following phases of the project will be addressed in the EA and subsequently in the EMP:

• Operation and maintenance— This is the phase during which, the Proponent explores the targeted commodities and undertakes related activities on site. The level and magnitude of planned exploration work is not clear at this stage. However, the Proponent has highlighted that both invasive and non-invasive exploration activity are expected to take place upon issuance of an ECC. Non-invasive activities include geological field mapping, ground-based

surveys, while invasive activities include soil and rock sampling, trenching, drilling and test mining. A 12 to 18 months' exploration period is predicted. Detailed information of the exploration methods to be employed will be made available in the Scoping Report. Furthermore, as the target mineral for the planned exploration, Precious Stones will be the main target for the planned mineralization model, and exploration targets will be selected based on the local geology mapping, trenching, drilling and assay results of the samples collected. The aim of the planned exploration activity is to delineate the mineral deposits and determine whether the deposits are economically feasible for mining.

No processing of mined metals with chemicals on site is planned for at this stage.

Decommissioning and Rehabilitation – The
decommissioning of the exploration operation may be
considered due to various reasons beyond the scope of this
report. During the operational phase and before
decommissioning, the Proponent will need to put the
exploration site rehabilitation measures in place.

The scoping process will identify sensitive environmental features that could be affected by the proposed prospecting and

subsequent mining activities. A separate EIA study will be conducted for the mining phase of the project.

5.1 Accessibility

The EPLs are located about 45,987 km are southeast of Aus town. Accessibility directly to the site can be made through the C13 road which runs through the EPLs.

5.2 Water Supply and Power Supply

Water required during the operation phase will be obtained from nearest boreholes and off-site municipal sources, and/or from any other approved water sources, through water abstraction permits. The total monthly water consumption for the project is approximately 30-50 m³. These figures will be confirmed and validated during the course of the scoping assessment. In accordance with the Water Resources Management Act, 2004, (Act No. 24 of 2004) and in view of the arid nature of the Namibian environment, the disposal of wastewater as well as all other types of waste is strictly controlled. Therefore, it is required that wastewater is disposed in evaporation ponds because no effluent may be discharged into the ephemeral, dry river beds in the interior of Namibia.

The reclamation, re-use and recycling of waste is encouraged. Electrical power required for the operational phase of exploration on the EPLs will be provided by diesel-run generators.

5.3 Equipment

The following equipment are confirmed to be part of the proposed project by the Proponent:

- Vehicles: Two 4x4 bakkies;
- Drilling Machines
- Truck
- Excavator
- Water Tanks
- Generator

5.4 Infrastructure

The EPLs are located in a desirable location when it comes to infrastructure due to their close proximity to Lüderitz. Some of the commercial industry and governmental offices can be found in Lüderitz. Lüderitz has an airstrip and a harbour. In addition, Luderitz has a primary school, a clinic, service stations, police station, and a variety of small businesses.

6 ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT

The EA process is conducted according to the provisions laid out in the Environmental Management Act (No. 7 of 2007) and its' Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations (2012). The primary objective of the EA will be to identify potential negative impacts that may be associated with the proposed activity, assess them and recommend practical and effective mitigation measures that will be implemented by the Proponent, to minimize these impacts. The EA process serves primarily to inform the public and relevant authorities about the proposed project and to determine any impacts of the project on the environment. The EA project duration is three (3) months (Appendix B). However, the project timeframe could be extended to address stakeholders' concerns and comments.

The main objectives of this EA are to:

- Comply with Namibia's Environmental Management Act (2007) and its EIA regulations (2012).
- Identify potential impacts associated with the proposed Activity.

- Inform I&APs and relevant authorities about the exploration activities, and provide them with a reasonable opportunity to participate during the EA process.
- Assess the significance of issues and concerns raised.
- Compile a report addressing all identified issues and potential impacts related to various aspects of the activity.
- Compile an Environmental Management Plan (EMP) which includes impact mitigation measures.

*Refer to page 13 (**Appendix B**) for the current phase of the EA process.

6.1 Environmental and Social Baseline

The proposed prospecting and exploration activities will be undertaken in specific environmental and social conditions. The summary of selected environmental and social baseline information pertaining to the exploration area is given below.

6.1.1 Climate and Vegetation

The climatic conditions around the EPLs are extreme. In summer the temperature is about 40 °C, while in winter the temperature is below 0 °C. Rainfall in summer is associated with sporadic thunderstorms, while rainfall in winter is mainly light showers with irregular hard drops. The mean annual rainfall around the project areas ranges between 25 and 50 mm.

The EPLs are dominated by two plant species, namely: Brownanthus Aenosus and Acacia Hereroensis.

6.1.2 Physiography and Local Geology

The EPLs are in the region of the Namib Plains and the Nama-karoo Basin. The Namib Plain is characterized with sand-drifts and prominent inselbergs largely of mid palaeozoic age. The Nama-karoo Basin is characterized by a flat lying plateau area underlain by Nama and Karoo sediments, locally developed karst in Nama limestones and on surficial Calcrete; dolomites sills locally weather to large rounded boulders. Geologically, the EPLs are located on the Namaqua Metamorphic Complex (~1.8 Ga). A broader description of the local geology will be addressed within the Scoping Report.

6.2 Potential Impacts

The following potential impacts have been identified so far for the surrounding towns, settlements and property:

Positive:

- Jobs creation to the locals (primary, secondary and even tertiary employment)
- Improvement to social infrastructure and other social facilities.
- Helps boost local economic growth.
- Open up other investment opportunities.
- Contribution to regional economic development.

Negative:

- Occupational health and safety risks
- Water quality changes
- Land use conflict
- Land degradation and possible destruction of faunal habitats as well as removal of vegetation that may occur within the target areas.

- Generation of dust from the prospecting and exploration activities and access routes.
- Visual impact (scars) on landscape that might remain if no rehabilitation measures.
- Environmental pollution.
- Socio-economic challenges

The potential impacts listed above were pre-identified. More potential impacts will be identified as the EA process progresses i.e. upon site visit and consultation with the public. All impacts and public concerns/comments will be incorporated and addressed in the Environmental Assessment Report.

6.3 Public Consultation

Public consultation is an essential part of the EA process. During the consultation process, interested or affected members of the public are given an opportunity to find out more about the activity and raise any issues or concerns pertaining to the environmental assessment and provide written feedback.





Figure 1: Location of the EPLs no. 7430, 7587, 7629-7631 & 7633 – 7635 South of Aus Settlement, Karas Region
