Deputy speaker clarifies PAP chaos

LEADER of the Namibian delegation to the Pan African Parliament (PAP) and Deputy Speaker of the National Assembly Loide Kasingo has clarified events that led to the abrupt end of the fourth ordinary session of the 5th Pan African Parliament.

Kasingo led a group of three lawmakers from the National Assembly to represent the Namibian parliament at PAP from 21 May in South Africa.

However, the session could not be concluded due to a succession battle between African regional blocks making up the legislative body.

According to the deputy speaker, despite the principle of geographical rotation that was agreed upon by the African Union, the northern and southern regions have been deprived of leadership since the body's inception.

"The principle of geographical rotation is a well-established principle within the union. The principle has been consistently applied with legal obligatory effect within the entire union. This was the bone of contention in the recent session of PAP, held in Midrand, Johannesburg, South Africa. For the last 17 years of the existence of PAP, the four years of presidency were held by

the Eastern, Central and twice by the western regions. The northern and southern regions never got an opportunity to lead the governance of the institution," bemoaned Kasingo.

Kasingo further noted that opposition to the demands of rotation by western and some of the other regions degenerated into chaos, thus warranting the suspension of the electoral process and the session.

"The southern region took the stance to demand the application of the principle of geographical rotation. If not considered, no elections will take place. That demand was opposed by the Western and some of the regions, resulting in the eruption of chaos that could not be controlled by the Ad hoc Committee responsible for the election processes," Kasingo.

Other Members who accompanied Kasingo included McHenry Venaani, leader of the official opposition; Hamunyera Hambyuka and Gerhardus Shiimi.

Enseline Beukes, who is also part of the Members of Parliament appointed to represent the Namibian Parliament, could not attend.

PAP, established in 2004, is the legislative body of the African Union, with oversight, advisory and consultative duties.

We have to reduce our waste – Kazapua

LÜDERITZ – It is important for local authorities to move to a circular economy to reduce waste going to landfills, Namibia Green Towns facilitator Lydia Kandetu Kazapua has said.

Kazapua, who made the remarks during a stakeholders meeting on Monday, said many local authorities pay between N\$900 and N\$1 400 for refuse bins, plus other costs such as fuel for rubbish trucks and labour to have their waste dumped – in the process, polluting their own environment.

"First of all, local authorities are buying these bins in South Africa and all that money goes there, denying the youth and local small business opportunities. You pay for your waste to be dumped; you spend so much money to get waste dumped – after all these costs, you come and pollute the only resources you have. It becomes a risk to animals and humans living at these dumpsites," she outlined.

Kazapua added that the increase in population, urbanisation, increase of economic activities, growth of informal settlements and lack of policy in place are factors influencing waste management.

"Our mission is to end waste to landfill and to end hunger through horticulture; we have to come to a place where we reduce, reuse, recycle and reuse our waste. About 40 to 60 per cent of household waste is food waste and such waste can be compost and used to fertilise the soil for horticulture purposes," she said.

Kazapua further said waste management can lead to green jobs that are environmentally friendly and which do not require qualifications.

"These opportunities are there and can be utilised, especially after Covid-19, as many people lost their jobs. Waste management is also

an opportunity for small business: youth can innovate things such as sorting bins; they have been denied the opportunity to innovate, so we need to create that platform where they can innovate," Kazapua added.

Namibia Green Towns was launched in July last year; it is a platform for local authorities to move from a linear to circular economy.

The towns involved in this project are Oranjemund, Lüderitz, Tsumeb, Gobabis, Witvlei, Stampriet and Khorixas, as well as Windhoek senior park.

Lüderitz Town Council CEO Reinhardt Ochs urged the youth at the town to take ownership of the green town programme to create jobs for themselves and make a living.

"The youth should be at the forefront of this project, as it is a youth project – and we should understand that some projects are for the long-run; results don't come immediately. This project is important for our town, as we have people living at our dumpsite; it is very unhygienic, so if we can reuse or recycle that waste to provide for those ones living there, it would be a great thing to do," he said. - *Nampa*

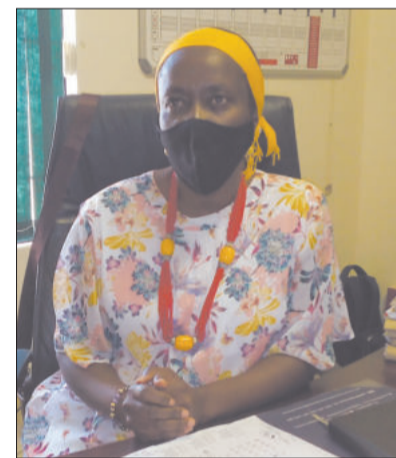

Frederick: 'Corruption should have no room in society'

KEETMANSHOOP – The fight against corruption and broadly effective governance underpin the achievements of all developmental goals, //Kharas governor Aletha Frederick has said.

She made these marks at the stakeholders' consultative meeting, held by the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) in Keetmanshoop on Tuesday, for input into its 2021-2025 National Anti-Corruption Strategic Action Plan.

Frederick said failing to promote and uphold ethical principles and maintain systems of integrity at all levels put the fulfillment of the entire national and sustainable development agenda at risk.

"Government fully acknowledges that corruption has been recognised as one of the world's biggest development challenges that continue to pose severe threats to economic progress. Corruption is destructive to the economy, democracy and rule of law and should have no room in society," the governor said.

She added that governance is about efficiency, effectiveness and making an impact in service delivery – and no one should compromise on these principles.

Speaking at the same event was Keetmanshoop mayor Maree Smit, who said a lot can be said about corruption

and how to prevent it, but it comes down to values such as integrity, respect, transparency and accountability.

"We can debate the breakdown in moral fibre in our society ad nauseam but it will change nothing. What is important to note is that it starts with the seemingly insignificant – the manager who received bribes to award tenders probably started by appropriating stationary," she said.

Smit added that the cost of corruption is devastating and affects those who can least afford it. "Those who are left jobless because of Fishrot, those who sit without basic services because tenderpreneurs did not finish the job but disappeared with the money, and those who suffer in their golden years because their retirement money is lost without a trace. Corruption is responsible for the inequality and poverty that help to create and maintain the environment in which violence thrives. It is our responsibility to be part of the solution and not the problem," she stressed.

ACC is holding consultation countrywide for input into its 2021-2025 National Anti-Corruption Strategic Action Plan. - *Nampa*
