COVID-19 REGULATIONS ADHERENCE

To ensure that the meeting, as a form of gathering, complies with the COVID-19 Regulations, social distancing was observed.

INTRODUCTION AND WELCOMING REMARKS

Mr. Silas David introduced himself and the EDS team present at the meeting, and expressed gratitude to all in attendance. Mr. David briefly introduced the project, clarified the objectives of the project, and further explained why the I&APs were invited (with reference to the Environmental Management Act (EMA) No. 7 of 2007 and its 2012 Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Regulations on Public Consultation).

COVID-19 REGULATIONS ADHERENCE

To ensure that the meeting, as a form of gathering complies with the COVID-19 Regulations, the attendees wore face masks and the chairs were set up in a way that social distancing between the people is observed.

INTRODUCTION AND WELCOMING REMARKS

The meeting was officially opened by Mr. Phillip Andrews from Resource Five Hundred Namibia (Pty) Ltd. He expressed gratitude to everyone in attendance for making time to attend the meeting. Mr. Phillip Andrews also explained shortly what the overall aim of the project is and how it will aim to benefit the community and country at large.

Introducing the project, Mr. Phillip Andrews mentioned that new shareholders will have to be brought on board because the volume for capital is high as Uranium and Vanadium are some of the minerals the Proponent is interested in.

The meeting attendance register was then circulated for the attendees to write down their names, and contact details and sign so that they could be added to the list of interested and affected parties (I&APs) and receive further information on the ESA process.

MEETING AGENDA AND PRESENTATION

The agenda of the meeting included the following main points:

2.1 Brief Description of the Project

Mr. Phillip Andrews gave a background presentation (**referencing BID**) of his project as well as current and future milestones to be achieved. The Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) or ESA and the reason that the proponent appointed Excel Dynamic Solutions (Pty) Ltd (EDS), an independent environmental consultant to carry out the EIA and apply for the Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC).

2.2 Presentation of Potential Project Impacts and Identified Geological Structure

Mr. Andrew further explained on the area selected, The Proponent will be looking at geological trends going east to west. East of Grootfontein the exploration has been identified little because the sediments of the Kalahari sands make it difficult for exploration. The contact zone of geological structures where mineralization can occur, The Proponent have purchased geophysical data from the Ministry of Mines and Energy (MME), from a geophysical survey that was carried out about 20 years ago around the project area. It gave certain target points of the physical anomalies that recognized the magnetic qualities of the rocks.

There was an acquisition of data from a remote sensing perspective which captures high and low long and short waves infrared reflectance. Furthermore, a South African mathematician conducting geological work, interprets the data of those responses and captures them in a database of minerals, and identifies the strength of the mineral in the area.

The first step is for a geologist to take soil samples, and the second runs ground geophysics (cutting lines through the dense vegetation).

To ensure transparency and that the attendees understand both sides of the proposed project activities, the Environmental Assessment Practitioner (EAP) presented the potential pre-identified potential positive and negative environmental and social impacts.

2.3 Explanation of what an ESA is, its Process and the Public Role in the Process

Mr. Nerson Tjelos explained to the attendees what the meeting was all about and why they were invited (with reference to section 21- 24 of the Environmental Management Act (EMA) No. 7 of 2007 and its 2012 Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Regulations on Public Consultation). Mr. Tjelos further explained what an EIA or ESA is and that the proposed exploration activities are one of the listed activities in the 2012 EIA Regulations of the EMA that cannot be undertaken without an ECC from the Environmental Commissioner.

2.4 Public Open Discussion (Interactive Session)

Mr. Andrews simultaneously provided the meeting attendees with the opportunity to raise their concerns/issues and or comment on the proposed project activities. The issues and comments recorded are presented in **Table 1** below.
