# BIRDS OF THE BRANDBERG AND SPITZKOPPE

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## TNTRODUCTION

The Brandberg and Spitzkoppe are two well-known mountains on the Namibian landscape. They are popular destinations for Namibians as well as visitors to this country. In particular, they are known as good localities to see some of Namibia's endemic birds. As such, these two localities are on the list of most birdwatcher's places to visit.

There is no checklist available of the birds that have been recorded at these two mountain outcrops. I now present such a checklist, so that visitors to the area may obtain more enjoyment from their visit, as well as record any additional species not included on this list.

## STUDY AREAS AND METHODS

The Brandberg and Spitzkoppe are both large granite inselbergs, about 90 km apart, that rise out of the Namib coastal plain in Damaraland. The Brandberg, which is about 70 km inland from the Atlantic Ocean, is the highest mountain in Namibia (2573 m above sea level) and rises 2000 m above the surrounding plains. It receives about 100 mm of rain per year as well as occasional coastal fog. The Spitzkoppe is about 100 km inland and lies on the 150 mm rainfall isohyet. Both mountains fall on the western edge of the pro-Namib, the transition zone between the Namib and the arid savannas.

The surrounding regions are sparsely vegetated, flat to rolling gravel and rocky plains, intersected by drainage lines supporting Acacia species. Characteristic vegetation includes Welwitschia, Euphorbia, Cyphostemma, Moringa and Commiphora species. Because of the run-off from the mountains after rainfall, these areas are better watered than the surrounding plains. More than twice as many bird species are recorded from the Brandberg and Spitzkoppe than from the pro-Namib in general.

In addition to sightings recorded during my own visits to these localities, I have included the information contained within the

Namibian Bird Atlas Project. To date 38 field cards have been completed for the Brandberg area and 88 for the Spitzkoppe.

#### RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

A total of 151 bird species have been recorded to date for the Spitzkoppe and 120 for the Brandberg (Table 1). The Spitzkoppe received slightly more rainfall than does the Brandberg, which probably accounts for the greater diversity of birds recorded at the former. Arid regions are characterised not only by low rainfall, but also by highly variable rainfall. For example, a rainfall station on the edge of the Namib with an annual mean of 86 mm experienced a annual range of 9-374 mm. During dry periods, Namib birds such as Gray's Lark extend their range eastward, while in wet periods, savanna species such as Carp's Tit spread westwards.

Many species typical of, and endemic to, the escarpment transition zone can be seen on the lower slopes of the Brandberg and Spitzkoppe and in the adjacent wooded drainage courses. These include Hartlaub's Francolin, Ruppell's Parrot, Rosyfaced Lovebird, Monteiro's Hornbill, Herero Chat, Rockrunner and Whitetailed Shrike. Barecheeked Babblers occur on the lower slopes of the Brandberg, but do not extend as far south as the Spitzkoppe. The gravel and rocky plains surrounding the two inselbergs support typical Namib birds such as Ludwig's Bustard, Ruppell's Korhaan, Stark's and Gray's Larks. Augur Buzzards, Black Eagles, Lanner Falcons, Rock Kestrels and owls nest and roost on ledges on the granite cliffs, while Bradfield's Swifts breed in the crevices and fissures in the rocks.

Finally, in years of above-average rainfall, a number of unexpected birds enter the desert. These include Hamerkop, Lesser Honeyguide, Greater Striped Swallow, European Golden Oriole and Cape White-eye, and flamingoes and pelicans have both been recorded flying overhead to inland wetlands.
