
Mining, conservation and tourism are currently at loggerheads in the Ai-Ais Hotsprings Game Park on the Orange River. Considering that the park is part of the trans-boundary Ai-Ais Richtersveld Transfrontier Park and in a biodiversity hotspot of international importance, something needs to be done to strike a balance.

Area of conflict: mining and proposed tourism developments clash at the Orange River

Small-scale prospecting and mining for diamonds has been taking place for many decades, but never with any economic success.

The Environment Investment Fund of Namibia supported this project to

- propose areas to be set aside for conservation only
- determine rehabilitation requirements and
- provide information for decision-makers
