## Land and water usage by traditional pastoralists

Abstract

The need for planning and implementing livestock development projects together with, rather than for, local farmers has become increasingly apparent. The production systems and the chances for sustainable range management of the communal rangeland areas in Namibia differ from the Namibian commercial sector. Consequently a different approach for sustainable development has to be applied. Management of pasture grounds by communal farmers in Northern Namibia includes the management of water resources, cattle movements and the usage and management of fodder supplies - subject to a range of conditions originating from the traditional and legal framework of the prevailing system. For future improvement and development of communal pasture ground also social implications play an important role. The information provided in this article on the implications of communal range management - without claiming to give a full picture - is based on the working experience made with traditional pastoralists. No quantitative data will be provided.
