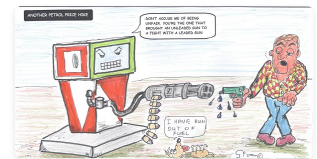
According to statistics from the ministry's spokesperson, Romeo Muyunda said, seven white rhinos plus one black rhino were

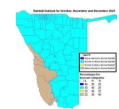

INVITATION TO APPLY FOR A SHARE IN THE NORWEGIAN BEEF QUOTA 2022

Eligible organisations are invited to apply to the Meat Board of Namibia for a share in the Norwegian quota 2022 available to Namibia for the production and export of beef to Norway. The quota is awarded annually to eligible organisations (i.e. organisations approved for beef production and exports to Norway) and will be valid for the period beginning 1st January 2022 to 31st December 2022. New entrants (provided they qualify for production and exports of beef to Norway) are encouraged to apply.

The sharing and allocation of the 1,600 tons beef quota will be done in accordance with the 'Cabinet Directive' for the export of beef to Norway as well as the Meat Board of Namibia Norwegian Quota Standard Operating procedures (SOPs).

All applicants are required to attach the following documents/Information:

1. A certified copy of the "Certificate of approval of establishment by Norway" indicating the establishment number.
2. Applicants should clearly indicate the total tonnage of beef applied for during the calendar year 2022.
3. Historic slaughter numbers and beef export volumes indicating the capacity to export the beef tonnage applied for.

Written applications, clearly marked "Norwegian Beef Quota 2022" should reach the Meat Board of Namibia on or before 30 October 2021 and should be addressed in a confidential envelope to:
