
Clerodendrum eriophyllum

Hairy Tinderwood

[5 records from 5 (<0.5%) squares]

A semi-deciduous shrub or small tree. Bark dark, rough, fissured; branchlets velvety, irregualrly ridged, sometimes with dwarf spur-branchlets. Leaves simple, usually in whorls of 3–4; held horizontal or drooping; ovate to elliptic; dull green, velvety; often with minute, sunken, glandular dots below; apex pointed to drawnout; strongly aromatic. FLOWERS white, tubular; short; style and stamens purplish and protruding beyond

petals. Fruit a round, fleshy berry, c. 10 mm in diameter; with persistent calyx lobes; whitish or yellow when mature; massed in dense heads and remaining for months on tree when dry.



DISTRIBUTION & ABUNDANCE

Uncommon in a few localities in the north-west; locally common in places.

HABITAT

Found on river banks

GROWTH FORM

A shrub or tree in the 3–8-m height class.

ANNUAL CYCLE

Only observed in January and March. FLOWERS recorded in March. FRUIT not recorded. LEAVES present in both months of observation.

CONSERVATION CONCERNS

None recorded.
