
Euphorbia avasmontana


Slender Candelabraeuphorbia

[98 records from 59 (6%) squares]




Many-stemmed, spiny, cactus-like succulent, with milky latex. Stems rarely branched, with shallow furrows, irregularly constricted at variable intervals. Thorns straight, paired, 10–20 mm long. Inflorescence 2–3 small, yellow cyathia borne between spine-pairs, leaving 2–3 small scars when they fall. Fruit a distinctly three-angled capsule.

May easily be confused with *E. virosa* and other large euphorbias, and are therefore probably underrecorded. The differences lie in the number of scars left by the cyathia when they fall, the shape of the capsule, and the shape and branching of the stem.




HABITAT

Common to locally abundant on hill slopes; uncommon on rocky outcrops; occasionally found on hilltops and in other habitats.




GROWTH FORM

A shrub less than 3 m high.



ANNUAL CYCLE

FLOWERS mostly October and November, but other months as well. Fruit individual records in August, October, November and March. Leaves only present on young growth; reported most months.




GENERAL

Sometimes used as a structural element in waterefficient, landscaped gardens. Latex is an extreme irritant to the skin and eyes.

CONSERVATION CONCERNS

This species is listed in CITES Appendix II.
