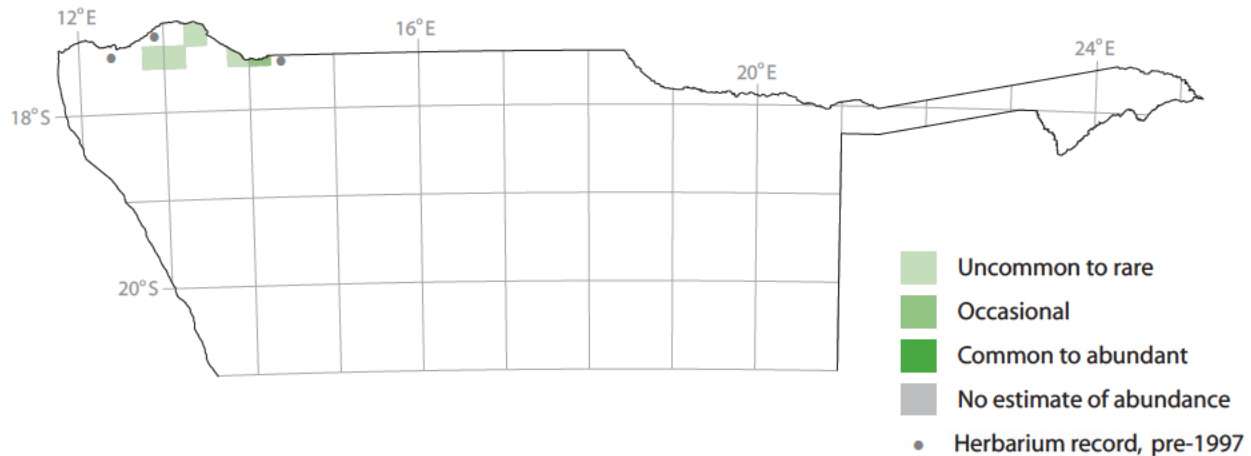


Hexalobus monopetalus

Shakama Plum

[7 records from 5 squares]

Crooked tree, often branching from low down. Older branchlets with persistent petiole bases looking like short, hard stubs. LEAVES simple, thinly leathery, elongate-ovate to ovate-elliptic; dark brown and hairy when in bud; dark green, apex often notched. FLOWERS pale yellow; petals crinkly; buds velvety red-brown. FRUIT fat, lumpy, sausage-like berries; orange to red.



DISTRIBUTION & ABUNDANCE

Uncommon to rare in the north-west.

HABITAT

Rocky river banks.

GROWTH FORM

A tree, ranging from 1 m to over 8 m

ANNUAL CYCLE

Observations only in March, May and December. FLOWERS March. FRUIT March. LEAVES present at each observation.

CONSERVATION CONCERNS

None recorded.
