

Kooboo-berry

Koeboebessie (A)

[7 records from 6 (<1%) squares]

Semi-deciduous to evergreen shrub, or multi-stemmed tree with spreading crown and dense, dark foliage. Leaves simple, ovate to lanceolate or oblong, 13–120 mm long, leathery; dark green above, with a dull, waxy coating or glossy, smooth; margin entire to finely toothed. Flowers yellowish-green, small, with a delicate fragrance. Fruit a round to ovoid berry, up to 20 mm long; smooth, bright red to purplish-red when ripe.



DISTRIBUTION & ABUNDANCE

Uncommon in the north-west; locally common in a few localities along the Okavango River. The three north-western records are range extensions for Namibia that have all been confirmed by specimens (LH896, 952 and 958). There is one earlier herbarium record from the eastern Okavango River.

HABITAT

River banks.

GROWTH FORM

A tree or shrub, mostly in the 3–8-m height class, but also lower.

ANNUAL CYCLE

FLOWERS herbarium records in October and November. FRUIT April, November and December. LEAVES observations only in March, May and December.

CONSERVATION CONCERNS

None recorded. Has probably always been uncommon in Namibia.
