# Communication with I&APs, and Means of Consultation Employed

Regulation 21 of the EIA Regulations details the steps to be taken during a public consultation process and these have been used in guiding this process. Communication with I&APs with regards to the project was facilitated through the following means and in this order:

- A Background Information Document (BID) containing brief information about the project activities was compiled, uploaded on the MEFT (ECC) Portal for project registration and shared with registered stakeholders / Interested and Affected parties (I&APs).
- A Stakeholders (I&AP)'s List was developed and updated as new I&APs register for the EIA. The BID was shared with the pre-identified key stakeholders such as the Kunene Regional Council (Opuwo Rural Constituency), Orupupa Conservancy, and other stakeholders.
- Project EIA notices were published in the *New Era* and *Windhoek Observer* newspapers on the 15<sup>th</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup> of October 2024- Appendix C.




Figure 1: The EIA public notice posters at Ekoto Village

- EIA notices were prepared for printing (posters) that were pasted at Ekoto Village Gathering Tree and Orupupa Conservancy Office. The photo of the poster in Ekoto Village is shown in Figure 1 and the original copy of the notice is attached hereto as Appendix D.

 Consultation meetings were scheduled and held with the stakeholders 26<sup>th</sup> of October 2024 at Omukaru Community camp and community at Ekoto Village on the 27<sup>th</sup> of October 2024 – Figure 2 and Figure 3, respectively. The stakeholder meeting was attended by nineteen (19) people and community by thirty-seven (37) people including two 2 Serja HGE Consultants and one Proponent representative. Minutes were taken from both meetings, and these are attached hereto as Appendix E.

# Feedback and Issues raised by the Stakeholders (I&APs)

The consultation period ran from the 15<sup>th</sup> of October 2024 to the 19<sup>th</sup> of November 2024 to allow the submission of comments after the consultation meeting.

# Concluding remark on the overall EIA Consultation process and feedback

Minor comments and concerns raised during the consultation period were not significant to object the proposed project. Stakeholders and I&APs would just like to see the project implemented, however, they did express their concern on the time taken at the MEFT to evaluate EIA documents and approve ECCs.

indhoek High Court Judge Eileen Rakow yesterday struck an urgent application lodged by a disgruntled Swapo member against the nomination of Netumbo Nandi-Ndaitwah as Swapo's presidential candidate, from the roll.

Reinhold Shipwikineni lodged the urgent application on Friday last week. He cited Swapo, NNN, as she is affectionately known, plus the members she appointed during the Electoral College as well as the chairperson of Electoral Commission of Namibia (ECN) and ECN.

Swapo and NNN opposed the application.

The judge struck off the matter with costs on the scale of one instructing and

one instructed counsel. Sisa Namandje represented Swapo and Nandi-Ndaitwah, on instructions of Gilroy Kasper.

They argued that the urgent application is out of date, and that Shipwikineni has a pending application in the High Court before Judge Thomas Masuku dealing with the same matter.

Shipwikineni, through his lawyer Titus Iipumbu, wants the High Court to set aside the decision of Swapo to postpone the extraordinary congress to decide on the nomination of its presidential candidate to April next year, after the elections slated for November this year.

They also want the court to set aside the nomination of Nandi-Ndaitwah and her appointment of the members indicated. The members are Saara Kuugongelwa-Amadhila; Efraim Nekongo; Indileni

# Neighbours committed to Orange River solution

SWAKOPMUND – Namibia and South Africa are considering the Report of the Joint Committee of Experts on the Orange River Boundary, focusing on enhancing bilateral cooperation.

The Political, Diplomatic, and Legal Committee of the Bi-National Commission of the two countries is meeting in Swakopmund this week, marking a significant step towards resolving the longstanding border issue between the two nations.

This committee meeting follows a direct mandate from Namibia and South Africa, issued after the third session of the Bi-National Commission held in Windhoek on 13 October 2023.

During this session,

ministers were instructed to receive and review the expert report on the Orange River boundary, which has been awaiting consideration since its completion in 2017.

In his opening remarks, Namibia's Minister of International Relations and Cooperation Peya Mushelenga emphasised the two countries' shared commitment to working collaboratively on the Orange River boundary issue.

"Our presence here today reaffirms the commitment of both nations to resolve this issue for the benefit of current and future generations. It further underscores our common resolve to address issues, of mutual concern and interest in accordance with the principles of good neighbourliness, transparency and mutual trust that continue to underpin the excellent state of bilateral relations and cooperation between our sister countries," he said.

South Africa's minister of international relations and cooperation Ronald Lamola called for stronger economic ties and collaboration between South Africa and Namibia, emphasising the need to maximise opportunities across multiple sectors.

"The Orange River is more than a geographic feature; it is a lifeline that sustains our people in this arid part of the world. Shared by the two countries, the river symbolises both the natural beauty and unity of the region," he said.

The Joint Committee of Experts, established in 2016, comprises five members each from Namibia and South Africa.

The experts were tasked with making recommendations regarding the Orange River boundary, a critical geographic and political issue for both nations. Despite completing their report in 2017, the document's formal review has been delayed. -Nampa


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# What is the cut-off age for securing a home loan? Experts weigh in

H omeownership can be significantly impacted by age, as it affects your ability to secure a home loan, according to Adrian Goslett, the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of RE/MAX of Southern Africa.

Goslett states that lenders often use retirement age as a guideline, meaning the closer you are to retirement, the shorter the loan period offered.



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


