Meeting Attendance

The ESIA consultation meeting had an attendance of fifty-eight (58) people, including two representatives from the consulting engineering team, two environmental assessment practitioners from Serja Hydrogeo-Environmental Consultants (*Serja HGE Consultants*), and one representative from the Outapi Town Council. 1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOMING

The meeting was opened and chaired by Serja HGE Consultants. The welcoming remarks were made by the Okapuku Village Headman (Mr. Simon Kandowa), who welcomed everyone to the meeting. The consultants present in the meeting and the Town Council representative introduced themselves. The Environmental Consultants presented the meeting agenda as per point 2 of the meeting minutes.

It should be noted that the meeting proceedings were facilitated in the Oshiwambo language (a local spoken language in the project area). This was to ensure effective communication and engagement, as well as ensuring that all attendees felt included and able to participate with a well-informed background of the meeting agenda, comprehend the meeting purpose for informed inputs, comments, and contributions.

2. MEETING AGENDA AND PRESENTATION

The agenda of the meeting included the following main points:

2.1 Brief Description of the Project

Ms. Fredrika Shagama (Serja HGE Consultants) briefly explained that the consultation meeting is about the proposed design and eventual supervision of the Rehabilitation works and Dualization of Road Sections: MR92 – 5km from the traffic light intersection towards Oshikuku, MR92 – 5km from the traffic light intersection towards Ruacana, and MR123 – 5km from the traffic light intersection towards Tsandi from Outapi Townlands. Ms. Shagama explained that the Outapi Town Council has appointed Tweya Consulting Engineers CC & Shield Force Consulting Engineers CC (Joint Venture/JV) to design the road rehabilitation and dualization works and supervise the construction (once the road construction/rehabilitation contractor is appointed). Under the Engineering JV, there is Serja HGE Consultants, who needs to conduct the ESIA study and apply for an Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC) for the roadworks, which is a requirement by Namibian environmental laws.

Ms. Shagama further explained the EIA process, ECC application, and relevance to the proposed project.

2.2 Explanation of what an EIA is, its Process, and the Public Role in the Process

Ms. Shagama explained the ESIA process and requirements in accordance with the 2012 EIA Regulations, specifically Environmental Management Act No. 7 of 2007, including Sections 21 to 24, regarding public consultation. The attendance register was also explained and circulated for attendees to sign as proof of consultation, as well as meeting photos to be appended to the ESIA Scoping Report.

Furthermore, Ms. Shagama explained that the ESIA process is done in compliance with the EMA, as the construction of new roads or upgrading of existing roads is one of the listed activities that cannot be undertaken without applying and obtaining an ECC from the Environmental Commissioner, which is subject to an ESIA process and ESIA Scoping Report as well as an Environmental & Social Management & Rehabilitation Plan (ESMRP). The ESIA process requires consultation meetings to be held with affected and/or interested parties and communities where the project activities will be undertaken, hence this meeting. Therefore, the ECC needs to be obtained first from the Environmental Commissioner at the Ministry of Environment, Forestry & Tourism (MEFT) before the construction of the proposed road rehabilitation works and associated activities, such as the extraction of construction materials from the area and water use for the roadworks.

A brief description of the planned project activities was presented to the meeting attendees. This included showing the draft locality map (A3 size) created for the proposed project, which contained the draft road route containing three 5km-distance road sections from Outapi Town's traffic lights towards Oshikuku, Ruacana, and Tsandi.

2.3 Presentation of Potential Project Impacts

To ensure transparency and that the attendees understand both sides of the proposed project activities, Ms. Shagama also presented the potential pre-identified positive and negative environmental impacts anticipated from the proposed project activities. This will establish the basis for mitigation measures to be developed for the proposed project in the ESMRP.

2.4 Public Open Discussion (Interactive Session)

The meeting attendees were provided with an opportunity to ask questions and/or raise concerns about the proposed project activities to be incorporated into the meeting minutes and used as the basis for the compilation of the ESIA Report and Draft ESMRP. The key comments and issues made in the meeting were recorded and noted for consideration and inclusion in the ESIA Report. These issues and comments are presented in Table 1.

Mr. Matti Magongo (TCE & SFCE JV): The survey will be done by us, the engineers, and the project surveyor will determine the road centreline. We will commence the discussion with affected landowners.

Mr. Paulus Aipanda: Omahalya Village	The establishment of borrow pits: The money paid for the construction materials is usually paid to the Traditional Authority (TA) office, and communities hardly benefit from this, yet they are sometimes left to deal with these pits at no cost. Why can the money be paid directly to headmen/women and used to better communities/village lives, such as investing in projects like putting up a transformer or water abstraction machinery from the canal for the community projects? This does make more sense; however, the payment of communal land fees to TA offices might be based on existing and established procedures, speaking under correction. I would probably just suggest that the TA use the funds for such purposes in the affected communities (villages).

Therefore, the community members, through the headmen, should consult your office to review the list.

3. FINAL REMARKS AND CONCLUSION OF THE MEETING

3.1 What is the way forward after this meeting?

Ms. Shagama thanked the attendees for their crucial input through comments and for raising their concerns. He indicated to the attendees that all their comments, concerns, and inputs had been noted down for consideration and for addressing in the ESIA Scoping Report, as well as incorporating their recommendations into the draft Environmental Management Plan (EMP)/Environmental & Social Management & Rehabilitation Plan (ESMRP).

Furthermore, Ms. Shagama informed the attendees that the draft meeting minutes, ESIA Report, and the ESMRP will be shared through emails provided on the attendance register. The final documents will be finalized and submitted to the Environmental Commissioner at the Department of Environmental Affairs and Forestry (DEAF) for evaluation and consideration of the project ECC.

Ms. Shagama thanked everyone for their attendance and participation. Alongside Mr. Kandowa (the Okapuku Headman), they concluded the meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:40 AM.

Mr. Matti Magongo (for Tweya Consulting Engineers & Shield Force Consulting Engineers Joint Venture (TCE & SFCE JV)): It will end by the road turn-off to the Town Council Dumpsite near Shaduka shops there.
2.		Along this road towards Outapi, there is a bridge or culvert with only one hole for rainwater to flow through. Perhaps this can be incorporated into the design work for upgrading.	Mr. Matti Magongo (TCE & SFCE JV): This is noted, and we will likely pick this up during the surveying for consideration/incorporation.
3.		The materials surveyor or engineer should try to investigate areas where water can flow to and settle. This will help the borrow pit site to be used later as a rainwater collection point (water storage dam) for community livestock.	Ms. Fredrika Shagama (Serja Hydrogeo-Environmental Consultants (Serja HGE Consultants)): This is noted. However, it is also important to note that the sites for borrow pits will be determined by the quality of materials required for road construction, but if that specific criterion that you mentioned happens to meet the criteria, then the community would be lucky. Moreover, the contractor would always be advised to rehabilitate at least one or two borrow pits for the road to be used by the community as a livestock water holding site.

1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOMING

The meeting was opened and chaired by the Environmental Consultants, who welcomed everyone to the meeting. The consultants present in the meeting and the Town Council representative introduced themselves. The Environmental Consultants presented the meeting agenda as per point 2 of the meeting minutes.

It should be noted that the meeting proceedings were facilitated in the Oshiwambo language (a local spoken language in the project area). This was to ensure effective communication and engagement, as well as ensuring that all attendees felt included and able to participate with a well-informed background of the meeting agenda, comprehend the meeting purpose for informed inputs, comments, and contributions.

2. MEETING AGENDA AND PRESENTATION

The agenda of the meeting included the following main points:

2.1 Brief Description of the Project

Ms. Fredrika Shagama (Serja HGE Consultants) briefly explained that the consultation meeting is about the proposed design and eventual supervision of the Rehabilitation works and Dualization of Road Sections: MR92 – 5km from the traffic light intersection towards Oshikuku, MR92 – 5km from the traffic light intersection towards Ruacana, and MR123 – 5km from the traffic light intersection towards Tsandi from Outapi Townlands. Ms. Shagama explained that the Outapi Town Council has appointed Tweya Consulting Engineers CC & Shield Force Consulting Engineers CC (Joint Venture/JV) to design the road rehabilitation and dualization works and supervise the construction (once the road construction/rehabilitation contractor is appointed). Under the Engineering JV, there is Serja HGE Consultants, who needs to conduct the ESIA study and apply for an Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC) for the roadworks, which is a requirement by Namibian environmental laws.

Ms. Shagama further explained the EIA process, ECC application, and relevance to the proposed project.

2.2 Explanation of what an EIA is, its Process, and the Public Role in the Process

Ms. Shagama explained the ESIA process and requirements in accordance with the 2012 EIA Regulations, specifically Environmental Management Act No. 7 of 2007, including Sections 21 to 24, regarding public consultation. The attendance register was also explained and circulated for attendees to sign as proof of consultation, as well as meeting photos to be appended to the ESIA Scoping Report.

Furthermore, Ms. Shagama explained that the ESIA process is done in compliance with the EMA, as the construction of new roads or upgrading of existing roads is one of the listed activities that cannot be undertaken without applying and obtaining an ECC from the Environmental Commissioner, which is subject to an ESIA process and ESIA Scoping Report as well as an Environmental & Social Management & Rehabilitation Plan (ESMRP). The ESIA process requires consultation meetings to be held with affected and/or interested parties and communities where the project activities will be undertaken, hence this meeting. Therefore, the ECC needs to be obtained first from the Environmental Commissioner at the Ministry of Environment, Forestry & Tourism (MEFT) before the construction of the proposed road rehabilitation works and associated activities, such as the extraction of construction materials from the area and water use for the roadworks.

A brief description of the planned project activities was presented to the meeting attendees. This included showing the draft locality map (A3 size) created for the proposed project, which contained the draft road route containing three 5km-distance road sections from Outapi Town's traffic lights towards Oshikuku, Ruacana, and Tsandi.

2.3 Presentation of Potential Project Impacts

To ensure transparency and that the attendees understand both sides of the proposed project activities, Ms. Shagama also presented the potential pre-identified positive and negative environmental impacts anticipated from the proposed project activities. This will establish the basis for mitigation measures to be developed for the proposed project in the ESMRP.

2.4 Public Open Discussion (Interactive Session)

The meeting attendees were provided with an opportunity to ask questions and/or raise concerns about the proposed project activities to be incorporated into the meeting minutes and used as the basis for the compilation of the ESIA Report and Draft ESMRP. The key comments and issues made in the meeting were recorded and noted for consideration and inclusion in the ESIA Report. These issues and comments are presented in Table 1.
