1. INTRODUCTION AND WELCOMING

Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua (Kunene Region Governor) opened the meeting and thanked the meeting attendees for making time. Everyone in attendance introduced themselves, and Mr. Junias Set and Stefanus Johannes then presented the meeting agenda, which is based on the requirements of the 2012 EIA Regulations: Environmental Management Act No. 7 of 2007 on Public Consultation, Sections 21 to 24. The attendance register was circulated for attendees to sign the meeting attendance as proof of consultation to be appended to the EIA Scoping Report.

The meeting proceedings were done in English.

2. MEETING AGENDA AND PRESENTATION

The Consulting engineer, Junias Set, and Environmental Assessment Practitioner (EAP) / Mr. Johannes, presented the agenda of the meeting, which included the following main points:

2.1 Explanation of what an EIA is, its Process, and the Public Role in the Process

Mr. Johannes explained that the EIA process is done in compliance with the EMA, as the establishment of bridges is one of the listed activities that cannot be undertaken without applying and obtaining an Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC) from the Environmental Commissioner, which is subject to an EIA process and EIA Scoping Report as well as an Environmental Management Plan (EMP). The EIA process requires that the consultation meeting be held with the key stakeholders and affected and or interested parties (I&APs) where the project activities would be undertaken. Therefore, the ECC needs to be obtained first from the Environmental Commissioner at the Ministry of Environment, Forestry & Tourism (MEFT) before the construction of the bridge and associated activities.

2.2 Brief Description of the Project

A brief description of the planned project activities was presented as per the provided engineering drawings of the proposed bridge and BID copy. Mr. Johannes emphasized the importance of understanding the conducted EIA Study.

2.3 Presentation of Potential Project Impacts

2.4 Public Open Discussion (Interactive Session)

The meeting attendees were provided with an opportunity to ask questions and/or raise concerns about the proposed project activities to be incorporated into the meeting minutes. The key comments and issues made in the meeting were recorded and noted for consideration and inclusion in the EIA Report. These issues and comments are presented in Table 1.

1.	Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua: Kunene Region Governor	Welcome. We are happy to be here because this bridge is a long-awaited asset for the region, something people have been praying for as long as I have been alive.	All in attendance: Thank you, Honourable Governor.
2.	Mr. Junias Set: Project Engineer	We have come today for a courtesy call to brief you on the project's progress, scope, and the environmental management requirements, including the public participation meeting scheduled for today at 14:30 with the two affected quadrant villages. Normally, we would channel everything through the Regional Council, but the process has changed. Your office (the Governor's Office) is now the primary point of contact for this project. In December 2025, we engaged the Regional Council, but it has since shifted here.	Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua: Yes, that is how it should have always been.
3.		In December 2025, we conducted the site reconnaissance visit together with stakeholders and identified the bridge location. We have since completed the topographical survey and the hydrological study. This was followed by the preliminary design for the bridge, which was submitted to the project client (RA) and received approval. We have brought some drawings to share today. Just a brief bridge design overview, it is a standard beam bridge design, approximately 102m long with a total width of 13m, of which the carriageway will be 7m (3.5m per lane), plus shoulders. The hydrological study helped determine the required width and height of the bridge. We have also prepared the preliminary design. We are now moving into the detailed design phase, which includes geotechnical investigations, currently underway on-site. You will see the drilling team doing about 9 holes, each at least 15m deep, to identify potential barricade areas. The work started last week and will continue for the next two weeks.	Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua: We have long awaited this bridge and strongly support it. The community is unlikely to oppose the project outright, but they will raise legitimate questions, such as: How many local people will be employed? And how will tenders and opportunities be distributed fairly, or why do the same people often get the contracts? These concerns are understandable, especially in a region with complex political dynamics. As leaders, we must manage perceptions carefully and ensure the process is transparent while still delivering a quality product.

		We are also identifying a suitable borrow pit for construction materials. A potential water source, a community borehole, east of the bridge site, is being investigated for yield, current use, and ownership. After the geotechnical work, we will finalise the structural aspects of the detailed design. We have not yet determined exact quantities or labour numbers, but based on experience from similar projects in the south (e.g., a 60m bridge that employed around 30–35 people depending on the phase), we expect significant but not permanent local employment opportunities. Workers will be on and off during construction. Construction is targeted to go out to tender within the next 3 months. Detailed design is expected to wrap up around April.	
4.	Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua: Kunene Region Governor	This area has many political sensitivities and dynamics, and the reason Mr Truman is trying to be part of this meeting, or perhaps you invited him. Communication must now flow primarily through the Governor's Office, which will cascade information to the Regional Council as needed. I expect differences in views between institutions; that is normal in such environments. With that said, in no way am I saying the regional council is irrelevant; they are just as important as the office of the governor.	Mr. Komeya Ilishuwa: There was a misunderstanding about the time of the public engagement. Mr Truman and the affected constituency he represents heard of a meeting scheduled for 10:00 as they were mobilising the affected communities. We have cleared this with him: that is a completely different meeting for the governor, not the public engagement, still set for 14:30. Perhaps he mistook it for an invitation.
5.	Mr. Stefanus Johannes: Environmental Assessment Practitioner	The project requires an Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC) from the Department of Environmental Affairs & Forestry (DEAF) of the MEFT. We have listed the triggering activities under the relevant regulations. The key elements include a site visit to identify potential positive and negative impacts, and a public consultation (today at 14:30) to gather community input. We will prepare two main reports: an EIA scoping Report and an Environmental Management Plan (EMP), a legal tool that sets out guidelines for construction activities. This EMP covers aspects such as working hours, PPE requirements, protected flora and fauna, waste management, areas not to be disturbed, compensation procedures, and,	Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua: My personal approach is consistent: what I say and believe during the day is the same at night. I am pro-development and have lobbied hard for this project. It will happen for the greater good of the region. No single individual or small group will be allowed to stand in its way, though we anticipate concerns and will address them. We must be prepared for the politics on the ground when taking on contracts in this region. However, the situation is

The goal is to maximise benefits for everyone while minimising and mitigating negative impacts where possible. Therefore, construction cannot start until the ECC is issued by the Environmental Commissioner.	stabilising, and I do not foresee major obstacles as long as the team does the right thing and maintains proper coordination.
6.	Mr. Junias Set: Project Engineer	We will properly document stakeholder engagement, including photos where consent is given. We would appreciate having someone from your office present to support the process and help address community questions on the spot. Thank you for your time and guidance, Honourable. We look forward to your continued support to see this important project through.	Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua: All information we share is public and transparent; there are no proxies or hidden agendas with me. I will join you myself for the community engagement later today.
7.	Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua: Kunene Region Governor	How long will the meeting be? Can you just quickly set up an agenda with my secretary to ensure the meeting does not unnecessarily stretch on for too long?	Mr. Stefanus Johannes: We already have one in place. The brief in which we explain the project and why it needs an ECC should not take too long; however, the engagement part, in which we address the questions and concerns, usually cannot be anticipated and can go on for quite some time. This can range from 2 to 3 hours.

3. FINAL REMARKS AND CONCLUSION OF THE MEETING

3.1 What is the way forward after this meeting?

Hon. Vipuakuje Muharukua thanked the stakeholders for attending the meeting. Mr. Stefanus Johannes informed them that their comments and recommendations will be included in the EIA Scoping Report and EMP that will be submitted to the Environmental Commissioner at the DEAF of the MEFT for evaluation and consideration of the ECC. The EIA documents (including meeting minutes) will be shared with registered I&APs for review and further comments. In other words, once the review of the draft documents by I&APs is completed, the documents will be finalized and submitted to the Environmental Commissioner at the DEAF/MEFT for evaluation and consideration for an ECC.

The meeting adjourned at 13:00.

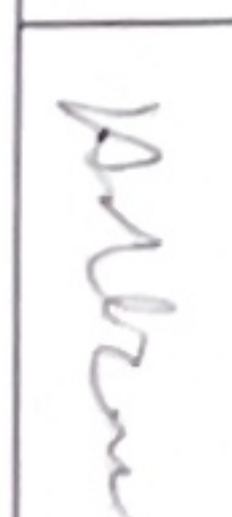

Western Uakaisiua Muharukua (Opuwo Rural Constituency Councillor). Before we move further, we should remember that we are gathered here to be enlightened on the negative and positive effects that the construction of this bridge will have on us. Let us come up with questions that are related to this topic and give the environmental consultants something to put in their reports.
5.	Chief Muharukua: Orotjitombo Area	There is an old grave, some 500 meters north of the river crossing, that we can show you. The waste will be sorted and temporarily stored at the site before it is disposed of at approved and appropriate municipal or recognised disposal sites. For instance, domestic/solid waste will be disposed of at a standard solid waste facility, and contaminated/hazardous waste will be disposed of at approved sites, such as the Kupferberg Landfill site in Windhoek. 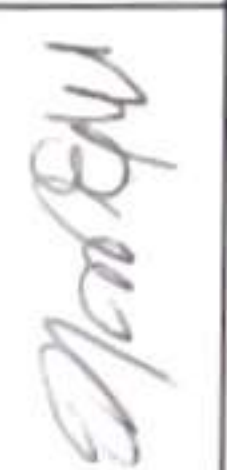
